Today's music features the two string stops on our Skinner Organ: A smaller scale, and brighter sounding Voix Celeste located in the upper organ chamber, and the larger scale, richer sounding Gamba Celeste located in the lower chamber. Both Celestes use two ranks of string pipes to create a shimmering ensemble effect.

In addition to the string stops, the shimmering flute celeste pipes and reverberant harp stops are added to the string pipes described above to mimic the atmospheric effect of the TV soundtrack. The harp is actually an array of metal bars, which are rarely in tune with the pipes. The summer time heat brings them in tune better than any other time of year. The string pizzicato effect is created with the French horn stop, which is a reed pipe with a sharp attack, reinforced with the Erzhaler, which features a strong overtone at the fifth.

Wed., 8/6 - 7 pm - Royal Oak Library, 222 E 11 Mile, 69th Annual Hiroshima Commemoration. Speaker: Lawrence S. Wittner, Professor of History emeritus, State University of New York/Albany.
