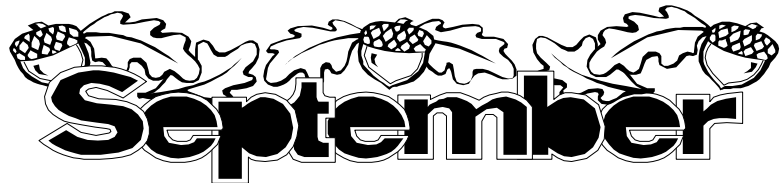

Membership

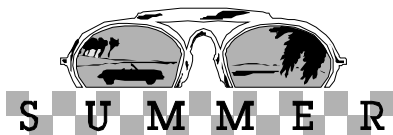

Children's R.E. Program Kicks Off a Semester of Learning

Forget the New Year or spring season. For me, September has always been the month of new beginnings. It's the time for new clothes, a brand new book bag packed with fresh crayons and empty notebooks, and a new classroom filled with potential friends. This year, the Children's R.E. program will be kicking off the school year with a semester of learning about the principles of our faith.

During the past year we explored a number of other faith traditions that have contributed to our understanding of the world and the divine. Now that we know more about the many traditions, which make up the roots of Unitarian Universalism, we are going to be focusing on the basics: the central tenets of our faith that define the uniqueness of UUism. Learning the UU principles will help us understand and develop our own beliefs *and* it will help us communicate the beliefs of Unitarian-Universalism to our friends.

All children are invited to attend the R.E. program on Sunday mornings beginning the weekend after Labor Day (September 10). Please wear clothing that is appropriate for playing and getting dirty (e.g. clothing which can be worn during art projects or outdoor games). Adults who wish to join us are welcome. We are also looking for several adult volunteers to co-teach on an occasional basis; if you are interested please see Margaret Wilkie or Athena Kolbe.

During the fall semester children will be attending the R.E. program three Sundays a month and participating in the service or attending an alternative program for one Sunday a month. R.E. Committee members are working with the Worship Committee to create intergenerational services; congregants with ideas or enthusiasm to help create child-friendly services are welcome to step up to the plate!

The R.E. Committee is also seeking a permanent Director of Religious Education. I have agreed to serve for four months as the part-time interim Children's

Program Coordinator while a permanent DRE is sought. Margaret Wilkie, the current R.E. Chairperson, will be keeping the membership apprised of developments throughout the DRE search process. Congregation Votes 'Yes!' on its Future

We are proud to announce the beginning of the future for First UU Church of Detroit. This past Sunday, August 20, at a special congregational meeting, the congregation voted overwhelmingly to approve the motion to sell our church house and social hall while keeping our wonderful sanctuary with its original Skinner Organ and beautiful stained glass window.

We have hired Derek Brown of Quorum Commercial of Detroit to market our property. Check out our listing at www.quorumDetroit.com then click 'Property List'.

Successfully selling these two buildings will make us a financially stable UU congregation because the required selling price will include an amount to:

- A) infuse the Church Trust with enough principal to generate the yearly interest income for the operating budget that, at a minimum, appropriately maintains the remaining facilities and current level of programming;
- B) provide barrier free access; and
- C) provide necessary improvements to the sanctuary and facilities to meet the requirements of the day-to-day activities of our congregation.

Our next steps include cleaning up our space, finding a buyer, designing our new space, hiring a minister, and expanding our congregation.

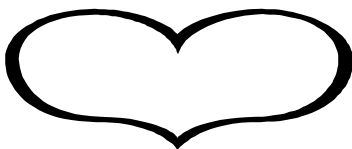

Several of us on the Board have been attempting to plan what needs to be done for the coming church year if we do not have a full-time interim minister. As part of that planning, it became clear that each of us who love this church and want it to survive with a healthy and cohesive congregation, will need to wear from three to five hats this year (in the words of Lencha Acker).

This may be a good thing as we will all have the chance to learn more about the operation of our beloved church and to improve on what we find, within the parameters of our church constitution and by-laws.

So think about what hat(s) you can wear this year. Can you serve on a committee or task force? Can you be an usher once a month? How about helping with coffee hour or sing in the choir? Do you have some good ideas about how to keep the membership we already have?

I recently looked at our membership book and learned that 173 people have signed the 'book' since 1990.
