I hope you all enjoyed last Sunday's celebration service. It was the culmination of a lot of work by a lot of people over many years. The linking of the church with East Michigan Environmental Action Council is a winwin for us all.

But now I want to thank some people who work for the church under the radar and are rarely acknowledged. It is likely I am not remembering everyone in this article, but feel free to give me more names of people to mention in the future.

Even though Dan Wiest was mentioned on Sunday at the service as being part of the work of the last two years, I think it is important that you realize how tirelessly he has worked behind the scenes since at least the 1990s. He also has been an active member with Amnesty International for a long time, a group that now meets at our church on the third Monday of every month at 7:30 PM. And while doing all that, Dan manages to find the time to be the church treasurer.

Elayne Sikelianos is another person who has done a lot of work without much public recognition. Elayne was a member of the board in 2009 and graciously stepped aside in 2010 to let some other younger members serve on the board. She also is an excellent cook who prepared meals for Women's Alliance for several years and catered the dinners for Vesper services for several years until February, 2012. Another major task that Elayne, along with Kathleen Jacobs-Johnson, took on last summer was sorting through all the "stuff" in the church kitchen and helping decide what to sell, selling it and then helping arrange to give away what was left.

Another behind the scenes person is Mark Schwing who has been a member of the church for many years also. Every Sunday afternoon or Monday morning, Mark finds out the title for the next week's sermon and changes the wording on the large sign at the corner of Forest and Cass. Mark is an artist and at times has had his art shown at the church and at other locations.

And last but not least, John Angry, has been our head usher for a long time. He comes to church at 8:30 am every Sunday morning to open up the church, participates in choir practice and then handles the arrangements to prepare for the service. In addition to all that, he arranges to have ushers take the collection every Sunday.

And at the foundation of all of this is the question of vision and mission. Who are we, and what can we offer to our community? That is the question that is foundational to all the other answers. Remember the four questions I asked at the beginning of our work together. "Who are we?" "Why are we here?" "Whom do we serve?" "How can we serve them better?"

Let's make this year even better than the last. And that achieving that goal begins with the work we do this summer. As the plans develop for this summer's work, we will offer information as it becomes available. But also please pay attention to the newsletters this summer – that's where opportunities for you to engage the planning process will be found. I hope to see you frequently this summer.

From Your Activities Coordinators


