### The President's Corner

July begins the church's new fiscal year, and it is already full of good news. The first concerns the sale of the property on Cedarhurst which was recently donated to the church. This long-time home of church member Eiko Takemoto was generously donated to First UU as part of the decision-making for Eiko's move to an assisted living facility in Kalamazoo to be near her family. We've been receiving good reports of Eiko's adjustment to her new home. Our good news is that the fully-furnished home has been sold to a young couple with four children—three daughters and a son all under the age of 11. We're happy to be able to report to Eiko and her family that this well-loved and cared-for home is meeting the needs of a new young family. They are delighted to be able to move into a four-bedroom fully-furnished home at an affordable price.

Much appreciation goes to Marilyn Mitchell who did all the legal work and acted as the property manager over the past month the house was on the market. We are grateful to Sean McAde who agreed to stay in the house each night in order to send a strong message that the house was occupied. His presence—sitting on the porch, conversing with the neighbors, cutting the grass—was crucial in helping to protect our asset.

The other good news was holding a leadership retreat early in the new fiscal year to evaluate our progress on the goals agreed upon a year ago and to set our goals for 2013-14. For each of the major goals of membership development, financial stability, and outreach/ relationship-building, we need to continue to ask ourselves why each of these is important. What do we hope to accomplish, for example, by reaching 100 members? What do we gain by increasing our public presence? Equally important are the action steps to be taken to accomplish the goals. We agreed at the retreat to identify the necessary action steps, timeline them, and periodically evaluate our progress. We invite everyone to join in this dialogue.

It's amazing to me how much activity goes on quietly behind an increasingly complex organizational structure to bring life and meaning to the congregation. The 19 people who attended the retreat on July 13 represented most facets of the church—board, minister, worship, communications, hospitality, ushers, publicity, development, social justice, membership, nominations, GLBT, building and grounds, finance, young adults, and EMEAC relations. I look forward to their continued wisdom and input—and yours!—as we move forward this year.

### The Rev's Room

As part of my wellness program, I try to walk or run four or five miles every morning. Now in reality, that means I get it done three or four days a week. But I do so often enough to feel like I stay connected with the city of Detroit, with my own inner world, and with my body. Fortunately, all three seem to be in a pretty good place right now, despite some wobbles here and there (As I write this, Detroit has just entered bankruptcy, which was as expected). Things are going better. Part of that sense of optimism is the positive change we are seeing in the city. The streets are cleaner, shops are open, shoppers and spectators are out and about, and most people seem to really be enjoying the changes. Sure there are the resentful ones (not altogether unjustified, there are relevant complaints, but resentment we have with us always, the more so as things improve for those who can adapt), but it seems clear to most people that Detroit is better now than it was even a year ago. For that, I give thanks.

One of the signs of improvement is that some old, rotted buildings are coming down. At the south end of the Dequindre Cut walkway, where it meets Milliken Park and the Riverwalk, there is an old factory, an abandoned, burnt out shell, the Globe building (thanks to Dan Weist for the background info). It was just a huge chunk of decay, sitting there looking like a catastrophe in one of the most attractive spots in the city. And it was falling in, having long ago lost its structural integrity. Indeed, that is the major problem in restoring it for future use. Old buildings are dangerously unstable. But this summer they have finally begun to rehabilitate it, and I have watched the process. The major struggle is to take part of the building down efficiently, but while also retaining enough structural integrity to do so safely and to rebuild. The same is true when we put a new building up. We don't start at the top of the building and work downward. We build from the bottom, establishing the integrity of the building as we go, with site preparation, utilities, and of course, foundations.

At the First Church leadership retreat we hold each summer, the board and committees met to discuss the goals and agenda for next year. According to First Church's leadership, the major congregational goals are to create a system of membership development, to improve our relationships with the wider community, and to affirm and stabilize our finances. We need to make sure we have nourishing things to offer to each other, that we are a good partner and contributor for other organizations, and that we have enough money to be secure in our relationships and aspirations. These seem to be very basic things, the site preparation, utilities, and foundation. We have begun to build, but there are things we need to do first. We need to establish, maintain, and develop our structural integrity.

Thus, in my opinion, INTEGRITY is the major theme for this year. First Church began its period of decline along with the rest of the city, in the 1960's. That is a lot of time for things to fall into disuse, disrepair, despair. The structural integrity of the church is a bit shaky, at present. But like the city of Detroit as a whole, the commitment and legacy of our history gives us the wisdom and resources to rebuild. The project for the church, and the city, is to restore our integrity so that we can take our place as fully functional adults in our roles and relationships. This year, we begin to truly rebuild!

### **Activities Coordinator**

One of our most active members this summer has been Mary Lou Malone.

She represented our congregation at the UUA General Assembly, which was in Louisville KY. She has attended several of these and always appreciated the music in the openings and closings. In fact, she asked me to bring back a CD of the music a time she couldn't attend.

The theme this year was Covenanting: promising positive behaviors and committing to follow through.

One workshop she attended was given by Julie Brock, a member who is in seminary to become a UU minister, giving tips about covenanting with young adults. (Kathe Stevens daughter.)

In another, Sarah Dan Jones, whom Mary Lou recognized from prior involvement in the music programs at previous GAs, led an examination of the Order of Service. The result was a realization that inadvertently it was less inclusive and welcoming than we'd like. Mary Lou will be presenting, at the Worship Retreat on July 27, the ideas to remove insider content and jargon, improve introductions, and make services easier to hear and to understand.

As our representative, she was obligated to attend the plenaries—the business meetings of the UUA. She says they have improved much over the years, due to the outgoing (in more ways than one) moderator, Gini Courter, from Michigan, and her predecessor, both presiding with a sense of humor and inclusiveness. New is the option for delegates to attend a GA online, including being able to speak and to vote.

Usually the last day of the GA is open to the public and those of us who attend invite anyone we know in the area to attend.

Mary Lou will bring her UUA GA program book with her for the next few Sundays to show and tell about other workshop and activities in which she participated.

On Saturday, July 13, while many of us participated in a Church Leadership Retreat off-site, Mary Lou was on-site at the Reproductive Rights workshop, sponsored by the

Michigan UU Social Justice Network (MUUSJN), UU Funding Program and the Grosse Pte. UU Church among others.

Women's rights included not only choice about carrying a pregnancy to term but, as presented by Mothering Justice, to have support for breastfeeding, child care leave, on-site child care, living wage to support a family, sick leave, the expansion of Medicaid.

Many of these were also applied to gay parenting and to single fathers. Adoption by gay and single parents was included.

Mary Lou reported that the National Organization of Men Against Sexism has been concerned with Violence Against Women are now promoting profeminist attitudes.

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Also in July, I attended the Esperanto-USA annual conference. Over one-quarter of those participating were identified as UUs ! At least 9 of us attended the local UU congregation—it was quite impressive when they asked visitors to stand to be welcomed. I'm currently the moderator of the UU Esperanto Network Yahoo Group.


