The Takemoto family has generously donated her home to the church. Since many of her family no longer lives in Detroit, they felt it was easier for them to donate the home to the church with the church making decisions about what to do with the property. After much discussion, the board decided to sell the home while having someone live in the home to keep it secure. Sean McCade has generously been living in the house to keep it occupied. Marilyn Mitchell is managing the property while Marsha Bruhn contacted realtors to put the house on the market. Marsha and I met with a representative from ReMax Realty on Friday, 6/21/2013 and I signed the necessary papers to list the house for sale. Marilyn and Sean are the contact people to help show the house and hopefully we will be able to sell it soon, but continuing to keep someone staying in the house until it's sold.

While these activities will likely help increase the church's bottom line, it is important that everyone pay their pledge by June 30 when our fiscal year ends. If you have not yet made your pledge for the coming year please contact Marilyn Mitchell or myself to do so.

So we have much to look forward to as we continue to grow in membership. This is the last column I will be writing as your president. I hope I have helped keep you informed about the church. I feel it was an honor to serve as your president.

The Rev's Room

This month, we begin the planning and organizing that will give shape and direction to the next year. Our board has been elected, incoming members oriented, and I am excited to see how the systemic dynamics function with the new personnel. Even as we will miss the members who move on to other responsibilities, we have lots of fresh energy and talent on the board and in the church, and I am looking forward to good things this year. We have several solid committees up and working, with more in the wings awaiting development, pending our goals for the year. I don't think I've ever seen a better start to a third year of ministry, in my experience. First Church is in a remarkably strong position as we begin the new church year!

I am beginning my third year of ministry with you, the first of my four year developmental ministry agreement. There are <u>five goals</u> that are part of our developmental ministry plan. First, continued steady **growth** and recruitment of new members. Second, developing a **stable ministry**. Third, continued **organizational restructuring** and improved communications. Fourth, **leader-ship development** with a focus on young adult leadership. And fifth, improved relations with **the UUA** as a whole. We are making considerable progress on all of these fronts, and this seems comfortably within our abilities, at present. As we move forward this year, these goals will be part of the planning process.

But really, these goals are just another way of saying, "Our goal is to build a healthy church." These are indicators of the underlying health of our congregation. The problem is not setting goals, or all churches would just set their goals and that would be that. The bigger issue is the ways we find to make those things happen. For instance, in my experience, short term membership growth is pretty easy, really. But healthy, sustainable growth is much more of a challenge. Right now we are seeing rapid growth, which means that we are doing something right. But the larger question is whether we can create the systems so that growth strengthens and builds the church, even as it nourishes the membership as a whole.

So here is the take away. Right now, we are experiencing very significant success. But that is now, and must be handled well to last. The major goal this year is to continue to build the organizational processes and systems to make that success sustainable.

My fingers become organs of sight as I reach to snatch clean each plant in turn. Sweat pours down, salting my eyes and leaving an uneven trail behind me like an ice wagon on city streets. I breathe faster and faster. The bag hangs heavier...but I must go on.

I hear a sound and look up into the scorched air. A vulture, his wings tightly clasped against his black body, is hurtling forward against an indifferent backdrop of blue to be about his unholy task. I come back suddenly to earth as I heel the cold slither of a snake across my foot, but he is gone with a faint rustle...and I must move on.

I gasp with relief as I notice that I am standing on my shadow. I shade my eyes and look up to be certain that the sun is at its zenith, then turn, lift the bulging bag upon my back, and walk with labored steps between the rows.

I stretch exhausted beneath the nearest tree and slowly munch the hard unseasoned bread on which lingers a faint smell of ants. I close my eyes and dream with a quickened heart beat of the dollar I shall have earned when day is done.


