Congratulations on a fabulous year! We have done very well this year, meeting or exceeding almost all of our goals. Well done!

As we come to the end of the church year, I am feeling the rhythm of the year, and the way that the energy of the church ebbs and flows, becoming less strong and even as we begin the summer. That is natural and normal, especially for churches that run an academic year calendar (most UU churches do so). 
