Greetings to the First UU Detroit community! And what a community. We continue to nourish ourselves and each other.

It is our solution to the seeming conflict between the individual and the group.

"Our seventh Principle may be our Unitarian Universalist way of coming to fully embrace something greater than ourselves. The interdependent web—expressed as the spirit of life, the ground of all being, the oneness of all existence, the community-forming power, the process of life, the creative force, even God—can help us develop that social understanding of ourselves that we and our culture so desperately need. It is a source of meaning to which we can dedicate our lives."

The five Good Eggs who were awarded golden eggs have picked up other members of our congregation from their homes, delivered them to Sunday service, and returned them home, through sun, rain and snow.

# 100 Members for 100 Years 100-4-100 Campaign Announced

The Membership Committee is announcing the 100 Members for 100 Years Campaign for 2016. The 100-4-100 Campaign is encouraging all members and friends of First Church to become involved.

#### You can make the 100-4-100 Campaign a success by:

- Inviting friends and family to services, programs and events.
- Welcoming visitors and new members to our Church before and after the services.
- Engaging visitors and new members in positive conversations during the Social Hour.
- Reaching out to old friends of First UU, that you haven't seen for awhile to attend a program or service.
- Volunteering to share information about First Church at groups or meetings.
- Assisting with any upcoming celebrations for the 100th Anniversary.
- Encouraging visitors to attend the "Introduction to First UU' session.

Though we have been very close to have 100 members recently, there is always at least a 10% attrition rate yearly in any church. We believe if we have 100 committed members, in 2016, our Church will stabilize and grow for the next 100 years.

#### Membership at First Church only requires three steps:

- Signing the Membership Book,
- Making a financial pledged to the Church and/or,
- Making a donation of record to the Church.

We hope you will be part of the 100-4-100 Campaign, which will officially start in January 2016.







**Unitarian Universalist congregations affirm and promote seven <u>Principles</u>, which we hold as strong values and moral guides. We live out these Principles within a "living tradition" of wisdom and spirituality, drawn from <u>sources</u> as diverse as science, poetry, scripture, and personal experience. The Principles are not dogma or doctrine, but rather a guide for those of us who choose to join and participate in Unitarian Universalist religious communities.** 

<u>1st Principle</u>: We believe that each and every person is important.

2nd Principle: We believe that all people should be treated fairly and kindly.

3rd Principle: We believe that we should accept one another and keep on learning together.

4th Principle: We believe that each person must be free to search for what is true and right in life.

5th Principle: We believe that all persons should have a vote about the things that concern them.

6th Principle: We believe in working for a peaceful, fair, and free world.

7th Principle: We believe in caring for our planet Earth, the home we share with all living things.

#### **Settled Minister Search Committee**

At a previous meeting of the Board of Trustees, it was decided that the search for a settled minister should begin this coming January 2016. Consistent with the UUA, this will be an 18-month process, with the potential to call a settled minister by Fall of 2017. According to the church's by-laws, the Nominating Committee prepares a slate of candidates for a vote by the congregation. Members of the Nominating Committee are: Mary Lou Malone, Lencha Acker, Rhonda Rodgers, Elayne Sikelianos, and Marsha Bruhn.

The UUA's Settlement Handbook for Ministers and Congregations recommends a seven-member Settled Minister Search Committee. Members of the committee should be known and respected by others in the congregation; committed to the congregation as a whole; willing to attend every meeting and give 250-400 hours over the coming year; reflect the diversity of the congregation; pledged to conduct a fair and nondiscriminatory process; and well suited to working as a team member.

The Nominating Committee recommends the following slate of candidates to be voted on at the special congregational meeting scheduled for Sunday, December 13, 2015, following the church service:

# **Quarterly Financial Report**

This will be the first of a continuing series of reports to keep the congregation informed of First UU's financial status on a quarterly basis. What follows is a summarized Profit and Loss statement:

The budgeted amounts are for the first quarter only.

Keep in mind that the large surplus is due in part to the fact that many large donors pay their pledge at the beginning of the fiscal year. Pledge contributions historically diminish as the year goes on while expenses do not.

The budget amount for the minister and staff has been adjusted due to the hiring agreement with Rev. Murray as a part-time minister which differs from the amount approved by the congregation at the annual meeting. While the agreement amount is lower than the original budget, the expenditures for the first quarter were higher because of some payments due Rev. Mohr from last fiscal year.

Other items to keep in mind with the surplus is that First UU bears some legacy liabilities for paying off arrears to Rev. Mohr for his retirement benefits and the City of Detroit for back payroll taxes. Those liabilities get first priority for any budget surpluses. A regular payment plan is being followed to accomplish this goal.

First UU also has not been a "fair share" congregation to the UUA or Mid-America region for years despite using their resources to help obtain ministers and assistance through troubled times. "Fair share" denotes the dues a church pays the UUA through an assessment per member to support the services they supply. \$2200 was budget for all of our dues, although a fair share payment was assessed at \$6,064.
