## Upcoming Sermon Schedule

## December 4th — "The Heidelberg Project"

Tyree Guyton

Artist Tyree Guyton will speak about the Heidelberg Project, an outdoor community art environment and the brainchild of Mr. Guyton, a native Detroit artist. It began in 1986 and was originally designed as a creative response to ongoing blight and decay in the neighborhood in which he grew up. The elements of the canvas contain recycled materials and found objects, most of which were salvaged from the streets of Detroit. Each work of art is carefully devised to tell a story about current issues plaguing society. As a whole, the Heidelberg Project is symbolic of how many communities in Detroit have become discarded.

## Letter from the President ...

Dear UU Detroit community,

I presume – based on what I have seen in social media and conversations I have had at church – that the results of the 2016 election have left many, if not most and maybe even all, UU Detroiters heartsick.

I'm reminded how **Colleen Dolan-Greene** and **Walter (Trey) Greene III** found First Unitarian-Universalist Church of Detroit. After the 1980 presidential election, they were dismayed and disheartened. Colleen and Trey sought out a community of openness and inclusion, where they could join with like-minded people. I want to believe that seekers like Colleen and Trey are not confined to 1980. Our church home may begin to see the Colleens and Treys of 2016 walking in our doors. Let us welcome newcomers and share their hurt. In fact, if you know someone who is hurting, invite them to join you at a worship service. Our practice of radical hospitality is needed now more than ever.

Isn't UU Detroit a welcoming place to invite your friends, to find solace together, and to fight for social justice together?

Have you seen the 11/21/2016 article by Daniel Lombroso and Yoni Appelbaum on the website of *The Atlantic*? The article, "'Hail Trump!': White Nationalists Salute the President Elect," includes a <u>video</u> portraying actions reflected in the title and contains hateful language. It makes clear the importance for each and every one of us to stand ferociously on the side of love.

I was struck by this particular example of hate, one of many circulating these days, because it brought to mind the work of <u>Martha and Rev. Waitstill Sharp</u>. The Sharps were Unitarians who, beginning in 1939, traveled to Nazi-occupied Europe to rescue Jews, dissidents, and refugee children. Will we need to emulate the Sharps? In our own country? In the 21st century?

The answer may be yes. And if it comes to it, we must answer yes yes.

Some of us are frightened. In addition to actively championing social justice — however that looks to you — let us treat each other tenderly, and hold each other up. Let those of us who are privileged pledge to take action to protect those in our community who are less privileged. If you have an identity that you feel may expose you to marginalization, please know you can come to your faith community for help. Let us expand beyond our faith community into the community of the world to look for ways to fight injustice.

Now is a time for our UU principles to shine. We must be fierce practitioners of our UU principles and of radical hospitality: welcoming individual people, embracing differences of sexual orientation, gender and its expression, religious background, marital status, family structure, age, mental and physical health and ability, racial and cultural identity or background, and educational and socioeconomic status.

Do you feel as strongly as I do that these beliefs are important to shout out and share?

## Policies and Procedures ...

## SO, YOU'VE BEEN WONDERING ABOUT UU DETROIT'S POLICIES AND PROCEDURES?

Featured policy and procedure of the month: Board of Trustees Meeting Attendance

In June 2016, your Board of Trustees approved a <u>Policies and Procedures</u> <u>Manual</u>. The need for a manual became apparent from several different sources as diverse as the Planning Committee to our staff, from individual congregants to the Board itself. The P&P may be found on the first page of our website, 1stuu.org. Click on any title in the Table of Contents in the manual to go directly to that policy.

We're going to feature a summary of a P&P every month in the newsletter so you may get to know how UU Detroit operates!

### - Planning Committee

POLICY STATEMENT: Because Board members are in a critical position to shape and influence Board decisions and actions. it is important that each member keeps informed and up to date on issues. Regular attendance is essential so that decisions will represent the opinions of the Board as a whole. Regular attendance ensures that issues are examined from a variety of perspectives and enables Board it members to be productive.

The board takes seriously its responsibility to the congregation that elects it, taking care to define what is an attendance problem and, perhaps more importantly, resolve it.

A problem arises when there are:

- 1. two unexcused absences in a row, or
- 2. three excused absences in a row, or

3. one-third of the total number of board meetings in a 12-month period are missed.

A procedure was created for the board to pursue to, first, resolve the attendance problem.

Should the problem persist, the board then will decide what actions to take regarding the member's future membership on the board.

If the board decides to terminate the board membership, a termination process is outlined.

Your UU Detroit board has worked together to accomplish much in the past year, including the passage of these policies and procedures!
