Upcoming Sermon Schedule

February 7th – "Black Theology & Black Power" *Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray* At the outset of Black History Month, I want to consider the first, ground-breaking work of James H. Cone, the father of Black liberation theology. One of the most important theological texts of the 20th century, Cone's book, "Black Theology and Black Power," opened the doors to contextual theologies in America. This is the first in a month-long series on the influence of Black scholars on theology and religion in America.

February 14th - "Stories"

Satori Shakoor Satori Shakoor is the Executive Director of The Society for the Re-Institutionalization of Storytelling and a host of The Secret Society of Twisted Storytellers. She has received international acclaim as a singer with "Parliament/Funkadelic" and is one of "The Brides of

Funkenstein." Ms. Shakoor will share her storytelling and musical talents with the congregation.

February 21st- "Sisters in the Wilderness"

Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray Womanist theology is the constructive theology of Black women who offered strong critiques both to the often male-centric Black liberation theology and the often white-centric feminist theology. The title of this sermon comes from the powerful book "Sisters in the Wilderness" by Delores S. Williams.

February 28th – "Water: A Tale of Two Cities"

Then on January 10 we had to struggle to get to church on a snowy winter day. But our community shoveled and salted, cheerful temporary greeters greeted until the official greeters could arrive, and we warmed each other with good wishes – and new members!

Chloe Lundine and **Carolyn Lusch** slogged through the snow to fulfill their commitment to sign the membership book. Chloe is a student at WSU who was raised UU and Carolyn migrated to the church through her friendships here.

Our newest members' stirring testimony about why they joined the church inspired **Airlie Strasser** and **Vercina Hollis** to step up to sign the book as well! Airlie has been attending First UU on and off for years and Vercina has been coming for months and is already a member of the choir.

We welcome you! UU're in a good place.

Community also looks like this: choir members, greeters and others who have stepped up to do **John Angry's** tasks while he is recuperating. Orders of Service are distributed, water glasses are filled, hymn numbers are put up, cards are placed on the radiators. I know this takes a worry away from John so he can concentrate on getting well and getting back to church.

And now for business. You may remember that the Board Vice-President position was open. **Matt Friedrichs** has graciously agreed to serve as VP until the current term ends on June 30, 2015. The Board approved Matt's appointment at our January 13 meeting. Thank you, Matt!

The Board also approved the final report of the 2015 Strategic Plan. Back in the fall of 2014, we set goals together, put them in writing and agreed on a timetable to meet those goals, resulting in great success in accomplishing what we set out to do. Have you noticed the new look of your newsletter? While we've been using the new logo for some time, **Alexis Mitchell** and I are also starting to incorporate <u>UUA-approved</u> graphics, color scheme, fonts, patterns and color stripe. Let us know what you think.

The Board is starting to focus on the 2016-17 Canvass Campaign, which will start in the spring. Each year in the Canvass Campaign we ask members to give careful thought to the tradition First UU Detroit represents, the role it plays in our lives, and the opportunities we enjoy for spiritual growth. You'll be hearing more about the Canvass Campaign in upcoming weeks.

Another project of the Board is a Policies and Procedures Manual, being organized by **Deanna McGraw**. When we had a full-time minister with office hours and a full-time office administrator, church members could easily get information about events, committees, meetings, contact information, etc. We now rely on volunteers to manage and communicate organizational information. And – this is the good news – as we continue to grow we find ourselves in conflict to use rooms or wondering how to communicate about an event. A Policies and Procedures Manual on hand and on the website will give us one place to reference to get information.

Which comports with our **4**th **Principle**: a free and responsible search for truth and meaning? That may be a bit of a stretch, but it will be nice when we don't have to search to know how to share information at First UU.

The goals listed below (including the primary contact person's name) will be the focus of our efforts over the next 12 months. To achieve our goals we need additional volunteers in all the action steps. Please connect with any of the primary contacts to be involved to move our church forward.

GOAL 1: Create new opportunities to expand interactions with EMEAC – Lencha Acker

GOAL 2: Using the 100th anniversary of the UU sanctuary as a theme, create opportunities to celebrate, increase membership and revenues to connect our past to our future – **Colleen Dolan-Greene**

GOAL 3: Create a viable social justice structure built on the 7 principles to sustain our beliefs, outreach efforts and activities – **Joel Batterman**

GOAL 4: Develop, conduct and evaluate opportunities and programs for spiritual growth – **Rev. Murray**

The final 2015 Plan report (posted on our website at <u>http://www.1stuu.org/</u><u>Governance/2015 StrategicPlanFinalReport.pdf</u>) was approved at the January 2016 Board meeting. Many of our objectives were met. The 2015 plan was our first attempt to create a one-year plan and it was a learning process for our congregation. We were able to take our new knowledge and experiences and create a better plan for 2016.

One objective from the 2015 plan which was not completed but is well underway is the development of policies and procedures for our church. Current Board-approved policies and procedures will provide our many volunteers with an agreed-upon way to accomplish our work. Policies and procedures will help to provide transparency, accountability and a focus to meet our mission.

All former policies have been collected and issues for new policies have been identified. All policies and procedures are now under review and will be presented for Board approval in the next few months. When approved, a Policy and Procedure Manual will be posted on our website. Training sessions and announcements in the Newsletter and Order of Service will acquaint the members with the new policies and procedures.
