Upcoming Sermon Schedule

September 4th — "End of Summer"

The Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray Labor Day: Growing up in Delaware, a state that lives and breathes on the rhythms of the beach season, the Labor Day weekend was the official end of summer. Children return to school, young adults head off to college, and churches often set the Sunday after Labor Day as the "start" of the year, a strange phenomenon for an institution that meets year round. Today, we will spend time thinking about what the end of summer means for people of faith and social justice.

September 11th — "9/11 - 15 Years Later"

The Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray On the 15th anniversary of the 9/11 attacks on America, I will speak about what it was like to live in New York City at the time of 9/11/2001, and talk about how this important moment continues to affect the lives of Muslims and other religious minorities in America.

September 18th — "The Holy Land"

The Rev. Dr. Stephen Butler Murray I will spend the week before this sermon in Washington, DC, participating in a World Council of Churches Consultation with American religious and political leaders on the Holy Land. I studied in Israel in the summer of 1997, receiving a first-hand education on the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, and now, nearly 20 years later, have the opportunity to revisit this issue in depth. In this sermon, I will share glimpses of the week-long conversation that we shared in our nation's capital.

September 25th — Detroit Musings: "Underneath My American Face"

Settled Minister Search Committee Updates ...

REMINDER: THE MINISTERIAL SEARCH SURVEY IS COMING THIS MONTH

A key part of the search process for a new minister to join us in September 2017 is a survey of our congregation: what do you think about ministers and church in general? Our Settled Minister Search Committee needs to know your views on these important matters. We need to know whether a significant majority feels a certain way on various questions. Or whether only a few hold a particular opinion.

The survey will be emailed on September 4 to friends and members who normally receive newsletters digitally. It will take about 15 minutes to answer, using Google Forms survey software.

Members without personal email access will be able to complete the survey on **computers available during social hour** on **September 11**, **18** and **25**. Members of the Search Committee will be in attendance to help folks use the computers.

Surveys will also be available in a **paper mail-in format**.

We ask that all surveys be completed by **September 30**.

If you have questions about your confidentially, your survey answers will be anonymous. We won't know who is completing any individual survey.

The Settled Minister Search Committee hopes you willingly ... even eagerly ... will take part in this exercise. Seriously, it's important for a successful ministerial search.

Practicing Radical Hospitality at UU Detroit

SO, YOU'VE BEEN WONDERING ABOUT UU DETROIT'S POLICIES AND PROCEDURES?

In June 2016, your Board of Trustees approved a <u>Policies and</u> <u>Procedures Manual</u>. The need for a manual became apparent from several different sources as diverse as the Planning Committee to our staff, from individual congregants to the Board itself. The P&P may be found on the first page of our website, 1stuu.org. Click on any title in the Table of Contents in the manual to go directly to that policy.

The key paragraphs of the introduction to our P&P manual explain why we need policies, the procedures, intent of and expectations: "The First Unitarian-Universalist Church of Detroit's Governina Board of Trustees is pleased to present a Policy and Procedure Manual to guide our staff and volunteers to meet our mission. The policies' focus is to be a transparent, inclusive, and accountable organization. The procedures provide the guidelines to carry out the tasks to successfully accomplish the policies. We

recognize that our work will evolve over the years and annual review of policies and procedures is required."

"We expect all Church members and staff to honor and follow the policies and procedures. We also recognize that as our work is performed, we may find that a policy or procedure needs to be changed. When this happens, Church members are encouraged to bring the issue to the attention of the Board of Trustees for review and revision."

This introduction to our P&P manual also includes a list of fiscal year responsibilities of the Board and committees, assigns those responsibilities, and provides a timetable of periodic reviews and destruction of forms.
